Hooray, the summer holidays are here! What exciting things will you do? The summer holidays are a great time to go for a picnic. Could you help to make some tasty treats for everyone to enjoy? You could make some sandwiches or a tasty cake!



Can you make your own ice lollies or flavoured ice cubes? Ask a grown-up to help you prepare them and then, check on them later to see how they have changed. You will enjoy having these on a hot day.



Visit a museum, art gallery or place of national interest with your family/or a family member



Have a movie night and make some popcorn.

Ask a grown-up to help you make some delicious popcorn. Have you ever heard the noise that it makes when you are heating it up? Pop, pop, pop!



Have you ever been on a bus? Plan a journey to somewhere fun, such as a park or zoo, and go on the bus. What can you see from the window? Can you play 'I spy' with the things you can see on your journey?

Make a rock creature. Look out for a pebble or stone and then paint it to look like a minibeast or an animal. Maybe you could make a whole family of rock creatures?



Create a sculpture with things in your garden or whilst out in the countryside



Go on a bike ride or a walk with your family, and discover what you can hear and see



Outdoor Maths

Place a hoop on the grass and guess how many flowers are inside the hoop. Count the flowers to see how close your guess was.



If you visit the park, count different things that you see. How many swings, kites, balls, trees etc can you see?



Go on a number hunt.
Pick a number between 1 and 20. Write some numbers, including your chosen number, can you child spot the number you will be looking for.
Then when you go on a walk, ask your child tell you each time they see this number: car number plates, house numbers, bus numbers, road signs,




Write numbers 1 to 20 on pieces of paper. Play games with the numbers. Can you put the numbers in order 1 to 20? Say a number to your child, can they point to that number, or place an object on that number.
Remove a number, can your child tell you which number is missing.



Outdoor Maths

Collect 10 sticks. Count out 6 sticks from the group of 10. How many do you have left?



Outdoor Maths

Go on a shape hunt around your outdoor area. What shapes can you see? How could you record what you see? Draw a picture of the shapes you find, or write what shapes you spot on your hunt.



Help with the shopping.
Count how many tins of fruit, beans etc. are in the cupboard. How many tins will there be if we buy 1 more.



Play shops.
Take turns to write prices on the items. Pay with coins.
Talk about the different coins you use, can your children spot any numbers on the coins, or name the coin they are using.



Read and make a list of your top 5 favourite books



Paint or draw a new character that you would like to have an adventure with, and with an adult write what kind of adventure you'd go on.



Write a diary - this could be every day for 1 week or one day every week. Write the name of the day, draw a picture and describe what you did that day.



Play a game with the key words list

1. Cut up a copy of the list below. Put the words face up on the table. Can your child find the word you say? You could score a point for each one you find. Try to beat your score next time you play.
2. Play pairs. Cut up 2 copies of the word list. Put them face down on the table. Try to find matching words, saying the words you find. The winner finds the most pairs of matching words.
